'Memories, Dreams, Reflections' of a Harley rider.' (a presentation for HOG meeting 10-14-14)

I would like to share something, with you. Something, I am sure, you can probably relate to. Now, understanding, what it is, that I have come to 'learn,' that **in our life, we will encounter experiences, that can be very profound, or awesome**; and how these events can change us. What helped me most to realize this, were through different times of travel and adventures. For 'riders,' like us, in the Valley HOG (Harley Owners Group) Chapter- through our love of motorcycles, discoveries on distant rides, on new roads,; and in reading about the adventures of other Harley riders in – HOG tails (magazine).

John Muir, famous naturalist and founder of the Sierra Club, had written about **many a 'life-altering, awe experience,'** discovered, on foot, through a life time, of mountaineering in the Sierra Nevada Mountains of California.

Now, in this presentation, I want to call these 'life-altering' experiences -awesome, peak, mystical, or 'oceanic' experiences. The experience within the experience.

Albert Einstein had once said- 'the most beautiful and profound emotion we can experience, is 'the sensation of the mystical. It is the sower of all true science.'

The Univ. of Virginia actually did a study on this, in their journal of 'cognition and emotion.' 'Scientifically- awe is felt about diverse events and objects, from a thunderstorm, a sunset, to encountering the 'vastness' of space and Big Sky, to more personal scenes of childbirth, even devastation. **Experiences which can literally, 'blow your mind.'** Referring to how the stimuli cause the person to revise his 'frame of reference,' where you feel more connected to others and the world in general. It prompts you to redirect concern away from yourself toward the thing that is eliciting the awe.

<u>One of my first peak experiences</u>, happened during an adventure hitch hiking back to PA from northern California, in the early 70's, It was January, late at night, and below zero degrees, standing on the side of US route 50, in east/ central Utah, when a man picked me up and dropped me off near a small town.

As I walked toward the lights of town, I came across this old stone church. Cold and exhausted- I walked up the steps and into the church. The door was unlocked. The only light inside was from a candle flickering dimly. It was totally silent, in there, and although it was only me, I had this overwhelming feeling- that I was not alone.

I was feeling totally humble, reflecting upon thoughts of gratitude, for this shelter from the cold, and for the stranger, who had helped me find it. Then, suddenly, the candle went out, I was in total darkness, and yet, this unexplainable calm, came over me- where I knew 'all was well.'

<u>At this other time</u>, backpacking in the "Mummy Range' of northern Colorado, in 2003, with two other climbers- it was night again, tired and exhausted, I had just crawled into my sleeping bag, at 11,000' Mirror Lake, our 'base camp,' after days of having hiked through the beautiful meadows and canyons along the Cache La Poudre River, and after having climbed to the summit of Comanche Peak, earlier, that day. As I laid there, looking up at this omnipotent starlit sky; a sense of the 'mystical,', again, over took me. So I jumped up and reached for my notepad, to quickly write down my thoughts, before losing the experience.

I wrote- 'what I have found, is that every day of our lives, refines the spiritual within us. Every night, like tonight, we can reflect upon the contrasts of both exhaustion, from the days adventure, and exhilaration, from the elements and beauty we have experienced. Finally, I have learned, that today, like every day, is just another day, that only the best of poets could ever describe.'

Later, I added the words, from a Pueblo Indian poem- 'In peace it had begun, in peace, it shall never end.'

I believe, **this feeling of awe and exhilaration**, is something that the "Road Captain' (Rick) and I had experienced, the day of <u>our motorcycle</u> <u>ride, Monday Sept 15th</u>, riding both east and west on the Blue Ridge Parkway (BRP), N.C., then, just past Little Switzerland, taking Hwy 80, south, down the "Devils Staircase,' a steep 'twisty' descent, then through canyon, alongside cascading river, past James Lake, then a remote, but short gravel road, and, on the paved road, back to Linville Falls and the BRP, on the fast, gently switch backing climb of, north, Hwy 181. At the summit, we pulled over, to catch our breath, and to be greeted by a group of riders on dirt bikes, who had, obviously taken the less traveled road. Then just before reaching Ashville, we were suddenly caught in a torrential down pore, where visibility became nil. We had to pull over and wait it out. To conclude, this presentation, I have only to say- such is **'the experience' and 'science of awe;'** and, the 'Memories, Dreams, Reflections, of a Harley rider.'

In sitting at dinner, that night, at Chiles in Ashville, it was clear, in our conversation, that we had experienced an awesome ride. As a biker- I would call the days ride, **a 'peak' experience**. In fact, in our trip, it had been one of four days, of awesome rides. And the reason why, members of the Valley Hog Chapter – 'live to ride.'

<u>One last example- from 2011,</u> I had been on a motorcycle ride, by myself, beginning in PA, through Rocky Mountain Nat'l Park, then central Colorado to Alamosa, a border town before New Mexico. From there, across the vast 'high' desert, above the Rio Grand Canyon, between distant Mountain ranges, on either side. A true odyssey and adventure, for any rider.

After spending the night at the American Youth Hostel, I set out on a short ride to the Indian reservation. It was still early morning, as I arrived, got off my bike, and began walking through pasture, past horses grazing, and a few weathered looking dogs, from the reservation. There were no other people around, except a photographer who asked, if I wanted him to take my picture, of me, standing in front of the adobe dwellings? Since he had seen me taking pictures on my cell phone.

Then I entered the ancient church, what I had really come to see; after having seen pictures, of the church, on the internet, taken by Ansell Adams, in the 1930's. Upon entering, immediately, I felt a 'presence,' that, must, transcend the boundaries of all men. Generations of Native Americans had worshiped here. Now, I stood alone, in the center of this intimate sanctuary. In complete reverence and awe.

I don't know how to describe what I was feeling. I knew, I had never felt more alive. From the ride, the day before; conversing with adventurers, from all over the world, at the Youth Hostel; to this very moment, inside an old adobe church, that, in a parched and rugged land, had survived the time and change of centuries.

Later, I remembered something I had read, written by a Sioux Medicine Man, as he had reflected upon a 'peak' experience of his own. Standing, alone, atop the vastness of a mountain summit, he looked round about, and beneath him, where, he explains, he could see ' the shapes of all things, in the spirit.' He writes- 'I saw more than I can tell, and I understood more than I saw. And I saw, that it was holy.'

To conclude, this presentation, I have only to say- such is 'the experience' and 'science of awe;' and, the 'Memories, Dreams, Reflections, of a Harley rider.'
